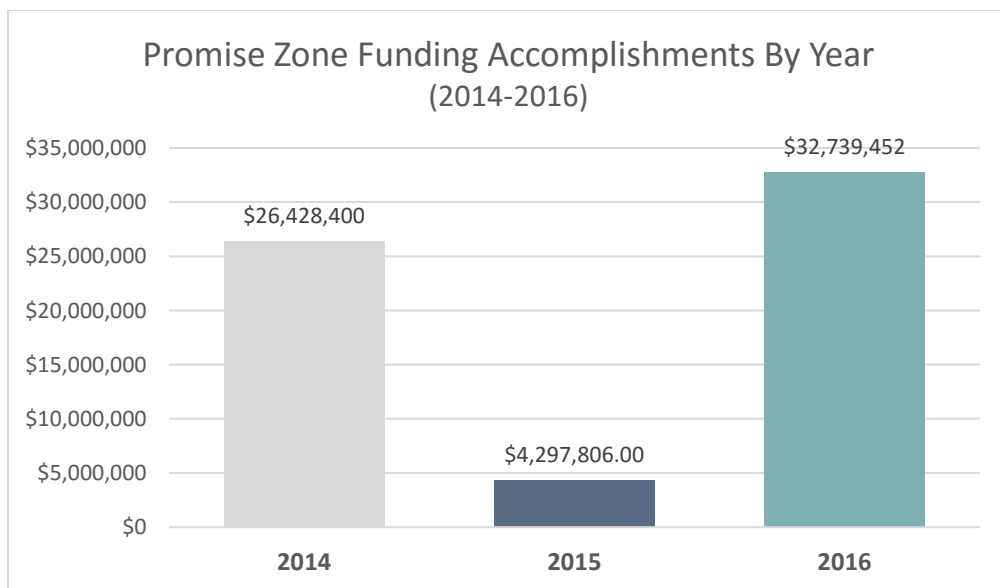


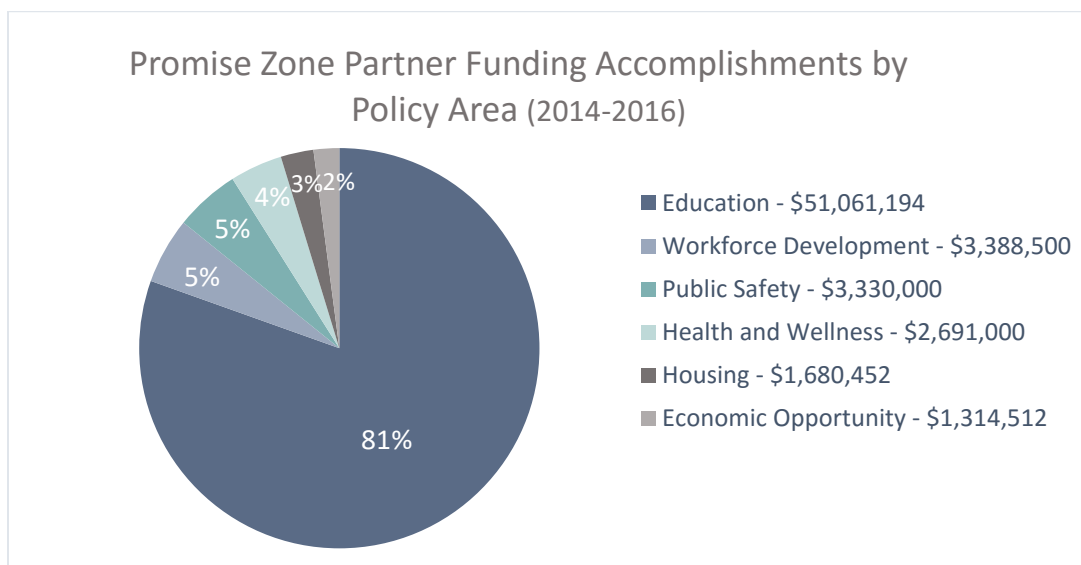
There are almost 60 federal programs that offer Promise Zone preference points to applicants whose proposals demonstrate an alignment with Promise Zone objectives and a direct benefit to Promise Zone residents. Since 2014, the West Philadelphia Promise Zone has provided letters of support for both federal and non-federal grant proposals to twenty-seven different partner agencies:

Across these twenty-seven agencies, Promise Zone letters of support have been given to forty-two distinct federal and non-federal grant applications since 2014. Of the forty-two proposals that have been submitted, thirty-three grants have been awarded. As of December 31, 2016, the total funds that have been brought into the Promise Zone with letters of support is \$63,465,658. The breakdown by year can be found in the graph below.



The amount of funding varies by Promise Zone Policy area. Education has the largest share, with over eighty percent of the funds awarded to improve interventions and services in schools and learning centers. Ten percent of funds have been directed to support Workforce Development and Public Safety initiatives, and the remaining seventeen percent of funds support work within the Health and Wellness, Housing, and Economic Opportunity policy areas.



A Year in Review: 2016

This year, fifteen applications across ten different agencies received Promise Zone letters of support. Of the applications that were submitted, six grants were awarded, totaling \$32,739,452. Brief details about the grants that were awarded in 2016 can be found in the table below. Further details can be found later in the document.
